Joined 3rd Punjab Infantry, 1851; transferred to 1st Sikh Cavalry, afterwards called 11th Bengal Lancers, 1857; Jemadar, 1859; Ressaidar, 1869; transferred to 1st Regt. Central India Horse, 1884; Resaldar and Resaldar Maj., 1884. *Decorated* for commemorating the Jubilee of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, 1897. Held the following medals:—India, 1857-58 (medal and clasp); China, 1860 (medal and two clasps); North-Western Frontier (medal and two clasps); Afghanistan, 1878 (medal and four clasps); Afghan Boundary Commission, 1884 (medal, Robert's Bronze Star, Order of Merit, 3rd class, Order of British India, 1st class). Barr. 1840, Lincoln's Inn; never practised. *Publication*: a poem, *Festus*, 1839, which passed in England through eleven editions, and in America through upwards of thirty. *Address*: The Elms, Ropewalk, Nottingham. BAILEY, Sir William Henry, Kt., cr. 1894; J.P.; F.R.G.S.; Chairman and Managing Director W. H. Bailey and Co., Limited, Albion Works, Salford; Director Manchester Ship Canal Company; Governor of the John Rylands Library, Manchester; President, Library Association of the United Kingdom, 1906-7; President of the Manchester Arts Club and of Manchester Shakespeare Society; *b.* Salford, 10 May 1838; *s.* of John Bailey, Pendleton; *m.* 1866, Jane Dearden (*d.* 1904), *d.* of James Dorning of Astley; four *s.* one *d.* *Educ.*: Manchester Grammar School. An original promoter of Manchester Ship Canal: was Mayor of Salford when Queen Victoria opened it in 1894, who knighted him on the first ship; inventor of the perpetual motion actuated by the tides for recording the rise and fall and work on the sea-coast; inventor of autographic instruments, pyrometers, etc.; lecturer on science, art, and literature. *Publications*: *Linnaeus and the Reign of Law*; lectures, pamphlets, articles, addresses. *Recreation*: literature. *Address*: Sale Hall, Cheshire. *Clubs*: Brasenose, Reform, Manchester. Followed profession of surveyor and civil engineer in England, till 1841; arrived in New Zealand, 1842; engaged immediately surveying districts afterwards known as Waimea East and Stoke, and divided them into allotments of 50 acres to the number of 220, thus enabling the land purchasers from the New Zealand Company to occupy their lands hitherto unallotted; then in connection with his partner, Mr. Thompson, similarly surveyed and subdivided 10,000 acres of the Moutere forest and valley; then occupied in various surveys till 1843, when they undertook a survey at the Wairau, where two other survey parties were similarly engaged; these operations were attended by the most deplorable results; the natives had all along declared their determination to prevent the survey and occupation of the Wairau lands by the settlers, and they had obstructed and removed two of the three survey parties; his party being strong, and the survey being smaller than the others, it was finished at the time of the Maori obstructionist arrival at the Wairau, and his party had returned to Nelson, all except himself, who remained, and accompanied the magistrate and armed party who came from Nelson to enforce possession of the land in dispute; the party opposing the Maories numbered 48 in all—24 of whom lost their lives in the attack and subsequent massacre; in 1844 he occupied and cultivated his land on the Waimea swamp, which soon became a fertile farm; during a portion of 1844 was engaged with Mr. Tuckett, chief surveyor of the New Zealand Company, in exploring the middle island in search of a suitable site for the Church of Scotland settlement, which resulted in the selection of Otago; when the Constitution Act came into operation with its six Local Parliaments, he became a member of the Provincial Council of Nelson, and continued his membership during the 22 years of provincialism, being its Speaker throughout, except in the first session; at the same time took a full share in connection with the several local bodies, whether Road Boards, Land Board, School Committee, Education Board, or Board of College Governors, and was a member of the successive Synods of the Church of England.
